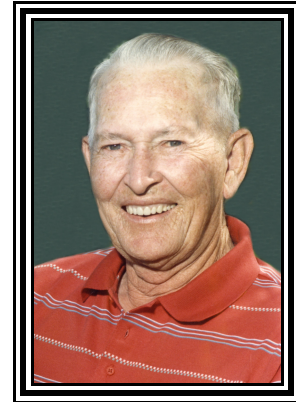


Obituary

Keith Floyd Adams, 90 year old Blackfoot resident, died at his home on Saturday, March 26, 2011, following an illness.

He loved to golf and was proud of making a hole in one four different times in his life. He also enjoyed fishing and traveling.

He is survived by a son and daughter, Craig (Phyllis) Adams, Spokane, WA, and Karen Gunter of Sunnyvale, CA, six grandchildren, Rob and Tom Gunter, Heather, Samantha, Matthew and Seth Adams, and two great grandchildren, Piper and Grayson.

Besides his wife he was preceded in death by his parents and five brothers, Harry, Ray, Don, Gene and Wendell.

Funeral services are being delayed at Keith's request until Saturday, April 9, 2011, at 11:00 am at the Groveland LDS Church. The family will meet with friends from 6-8 at the Hawker Funeral Home on Friday (4/8/11) and Saturday at the church for an hour prior to services.

Interment will be in the Groveland Cemetery where military honors will be provided by the Stewart Hoover Post #23 of the American Legion.
